The collective responses from all three panelists, recount a system that is inherently biased against non-caucasians and in need of improvement, thus providing more just service and dignity towards all. Although each panelist represented greatly different aspects of the system, they verified the same story.

The points below are steps toward improving equal justice on which they generally agreed:

- Increase resources for public defense attorneys including tools and training.
- Encourage strategies within the system to embrace and develop procedures that are more humanitarian. View people with dignity.
- Establish a broader and clearer recognition that there is blatant and structured racism within the CJS.

- Although recent protests of injustice and racism within CJS have been intense, it is essential that the movement keep moving towards real change.
- It is unfair to use a defendant's ability to pay bail to determine if they should be locked up during the, potentially very long process.

A specific note is worth pointing out:

The U.S. Supreme Court ruled in 2012 that it is unconstitutional to give juveniles a life sentence. Michigan rates second in the country for highest number of juveniles sentenced to life. Many are still waiting for re-sentencing.
